



## 911 Services Not in Jeopardy

You have likely seen or heard one of the recent news stories about 911 services for cities being terminated by Sarpy County in 2012. First and foremost we want to assure the residents of La Vista they will not be without 911 services — the Mayor and City Council would never let that happen.

In 1994 all residents of Sarpy County, including those who live in cities, passed a multi-million dollar bond authorizing the county to build a combined 911 center. Subsequently, the cities and the county entered into an agreement to operate the center. All parties agreed to a funding formula which determined how much each city and the county would pay.

Following a six month extension, the current agreement expired 12 months ago and negotiations for a successor agreement have been ongoing. La Vista continues to pay Sarpy County for the operation of the 911 center and has also agreed to periodic budget increases.

La Vista is specifically concerned about:

- The county changing the formula to transfer a higher proportion of the funding to cities.
- Our citizens already pay a tax levied by Sarpy County for 911 services and by charging cities an additional fee, our citizens would have to pay twice.



- The County Board has unilateral authority to adopt and impose a 911 budget with limitless increases. La Vista has asked for meaningful input into the process since we have to pay a portion of the costs.

While we do not believe our issues are unreasonable, we understand the importance of 911 services to our residents and will continue to work in good faith to reach an agreement with the county that is acceptable to both sides. We remain hopeful that an agreement with Sarpy County can be negotiated. If an agreement is not reached, La Vista will continue to provide 911 services to residents through whatever means necessary. ## A Remarkable Decade, Planning for the Future

We have spent a great deal of time this year focusing on the past as we celebrated 50 years as a City. The constant during this time period, and more particularly over the last 10 years, has been tremendous growth and change. La Vista's population has increased nearly 65 percent over the last 10 years. With that growth came both challenges and rewards. It is exciting to be a dynamic City that has great plans for the future. It is also a challenge to continue to provide high quality services to an increased number of residents while keeping costs under control.

In preparing La Vista's 2010-2011 budget, City officials had to deal with this ongoing challenge in the midst of an uncertain economic environment. La Vista's assessed valuation increased by only 3.4 percent last year, the smallest increase in 10 years. As a result, the Mayor and City Council worked diligently to hold the line on governmental growth and spending. The total property tax levy

remains the same as last year at .5235 cents per \$100 of valuation. This translates into an annual City property tax bill of \$785.25 on a home valued at \$150,000, or \$65.44 per month. Some of the amenities you receive for this payment include police, fire and EMS protection, access to a wonderful library, well maintained streets that are promptly cleared of snow and ice in the winter, a community center and beautiful parks.

"We have always taken a fiscally conservative approach to the budget process and this year was no exception," said City Administrator Brenda Gunn. "We are still living in a challenging economic climate so it is imperative for local government to have a long-term focus when making short-term decisions."

La Vista will continue to be a city on the move as its leaders work to ensure fiscal responsibility and excellent service to residents.

## TIPS TO AVOID CAR BREAK-INS

La Vista residents and visitors are encouraged to help reduce the potential for car thefts and break-ins by using these simple yet effective ways to lessen the opportunity for criminal activity in our community.

- Park your car in an area that is well lit.
- Be vigilant, park your car where you can watch it.
- Do not leave your keys in the ignition or in the vehicle.
- Keep valuables in the glove compartment or trunk of your car. (remember, "out of sight, out of mind").

Even if you are only gone for a short period of time, do not leave your wallet, purse, iPod, cell phone or anything of value in the car. It only takes a matter of seconds for someone else to reach in and grab them!

Vehicles with tinted windows are more likely to be broken into because the tinting hides the activities of the bad guys while in your car.

Bad guys also target cars with the adhesive type of window tinting because it muffles the sound of breaking glass.

Convertibles may look cool, but they can be expensive to repair if the bad guys decide to slice a hole in the top to get to your iPod. Do not consider locked doors on a convertible as "safe".

Report any suspicious activity immediately! If you think you see someone breaking into a car, call 9-1-1. If you need to report a theft from a vehicle, call our non-emergency number at 331-1353.

If a break-in does occur, notify the La Vista Police Department immediately. Even if nothing of value has been taken or you feel that it is not worth reporting, let the police know. There is a chance that other break-ins may have occurred and any information you provide may lead to an arrest.

## SNOW REMINDERS

Whenever two or more inches of snow, ice and/or sleet has fallen on the streets of La Vista, or when the Mayor declares a **snow emergency** with notice to the news media, it is unlawful for any automobile to be parked on any public street within the City for 24 hours or until the street has been plowed by the City snow plows. Any vehicle that is not moved will be towed at the owner's expense.

Occupants of any residential lot or the owner of any vacant residential lot(s) within the City of La Vista are required to **clean their sidewalks** of any snow, sleet, mud or ice within 24 hours after the end of a storm. Sidewalks in a business district shall be cleaned within 5 hours after the end of the storm unless the snow fall took place during the night, in which case the sidewalk shall be cleaned before 8:30 a.m. the following day.

## Recently Adopted I-Codes


