

City of La Vista
Park & Recreation Advisory Committee Minutes
May 18, 2022

A meeting of the Park and Recreation Advisory Committee for the City of LaVista convened in open and public session at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 18, 2022. Present was Recreation Director Scott Stopak, Asst. Recreation Director David Karlson, Senior Services Manager Kaily Stanley, Youth & Adult Sports Services Manager Denny Dinan, Administrative Assistant Sue Tangeman, Parks Foreman Zach Burt, Advisory Board Chairperson Pat Lodes, Members Jeff Kupfer, and Bobette Jones. Absent was and Member Brenda Mechels-Stuby.

A notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Papillion Times on May 11, 2022. Simultaneously given to the members of the Park and Recreation Advisory Committee and a copy of their acknowledgment of receipt of the notice are attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated, in advance notice to the members of the Park and Recreation Advisory Committee of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter were taken while the convened meeting was open to attendance of the public. Further, all the subjects included in said proceedings were contained in the agenda for inspection within ten working days after said meeting, prior to the convened meeting of said body.

CALL TO ORDER

Director Scott Stopak called the meeting to order.

Stopak led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Stopak made an announcement of the location of the posted copy of the Open Meetings Act for public reference and read the Emergency Procedures Statement.

A. CONSENT AGENDA

1. Stopak asked for a motion to approve the minutes from the March 16, 2022 meeting. Motion made by Member Jones. Seconded by Chairperson Lodes. All aye. Motion carried.

2. REPORTS FROM RECREATION DIRECTOR AND STAFF

Stopak said the pool is getting ready to open on May 28th. Dani Howard is the manager again this year, with Ethan Buso and Ian Mathouser the assistant managers. There are 15 guards hired.

The ribbon cutting for the Nebraska Multi-Sports Complex is on Friday, May 27 at 11:00 a.m. Governor Ricketts and Mayor Kindig will attend.

VIRTUAL RECREATION CENTER, SPECIAL EVENTS, AND PROGRAMS

Our Armed Combat Academy Fencing Club hosted an all-day round-robin tournament in the gym on Saturday, April 23. The tournament featured dozens of combatants fighting in three categories: Small Sword, Rapier, and Saber. This was a regional tournament with fighters coming from Nebraska, Kansas, and Iowa. One participant from Scotland was visiting a friend in Lincoln and heard about the tournament the night before and drove up that morning to participate. In addition to the fighting another highlight were the elaborate renaissance styled costumes the combatants wore.

Our annual Arbor Day celebration was held last Friday evening in Center Park. The Celebration started with Mayor Kindig and Council Member Teri Quick reading our Arbor Day proclamation, followed by a storybook reading by librarian Ashley Wemhoff. Afterwards, there was a family storybook walk around the lake, and as patrons left, they were able to pick up a free American Elm sapling, Nebraska wildflower seed packet and a grab-and-go craft for their children.

Our Spring Kite Festival was held on Sunday May 1st at the La Vista Sports Complex. The nice weather and winds helped draw a steady crowd of viewers and participants throughout the day.

The annual Omaha Bead Affair was held April 30-May 1 in the Community Center. The event hosted regional vendors with a large selection of merchandise. Jewelry making and beading supplies, seed beads, bead kits, metal craft supplies, gemstones, glass beads, clay beads, Czech glass beads, crystals, and leather goods were all available. Bead classes were also available. The event also featured a selection of handmade, ready-to-wear, finished jewelry. Glass Bead Making Demonstrations from the Midwest Lampworkers Guild and Beaded art displays of recent works from the Omaha Beady Bunch were given.

On March 27, 2022, we partnered with a new La Vista business, the Nebraska Disc Golf Company located at 71st & Harrison, which recently opened. Together we hosted a 22 hole Disc Golf Tournament at Central Park. The holes started up by the old golf course clubhouse and spread all the way down near the tennis courts and then back up around the lakes near the clubhouse.

Following is an email I received from Will Schram the owner of Nebraska Disc Golf Company and the tournament director:

I wanted to thank you and Scott for everything you did to make the La Vista Falls tournament happen. It was a smashing success. Every participant I spoke with enjoyed themselves- even the ones who threw their discs in the lake.

We had 103 players in the tournament. The oldest disc golfer in our event was 69 years old, the youngest was 8. We had players from as far away as Des Moines, Kansas City and Sioux Falls. One golfer and his son drove all the way from Cozad, Nebraska, just to play this event. We had golfers from La Vista, Omaha, Plattsmouth, Bellevue, Fremont,

Ft. Calhoun, Lincoln, Waverly and numerous other cities in the Metro. Even the neighbors and park patrons seemed to enjoy disc golf in the park.

We look forward to making this an annual event - 2023 could be bigger and better. In the meantime, After the event, I made one final walk of the park to make sure everything was cleaned up. During that walk I saw a young man walking the trail with disc golf discs in hand. He told me he and his wife live a few blocks from the park and they had seen our targets earlier in the day. He assumed they were a permanent installation and walked down wanting to play. I had to break the news to him, but I hope he reached out to City Hall.

If you build it, they will come.

In our initial meeting, we discussed youth events that had been hosted at La Vista Falls in the past. I would love to bring disc golf to the kids and families of La Vista.
