

Central Park East rendering 1

City Council approves purchase of playground equipment for Central Park East.

Visitors to Central Park East can expect to see construction of a new playground this year.

The City Council approved a recommendation from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board recently for the design of the new playground, which will be installed this calendar year. Exact timelines for construction will be based on the timing of the equipment being delivered.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board participated in a design process that walked them through the various public input received on the City's parks in the past few years and helped them determine the elements they most wanted to see in the new Central Park East equipment.

"I think families are going to find it pretty cool, pretty welcoming," said Pat Lodes, the chairman of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

"We put ourselves in the shoes of the parents in the area that take their young children to that playground, and everyone's eyes opened up to something different in La Vista, something that hopefully is the start of things to come as we replace playground equipment."

Lodes has served on the Parks and Recreation board for 25 years and he said the design of this new playground is representative of the evolution of playgrounds over the years.

"It's not your typical playground. They have evolved so much from when we were kids. Now you have all these activities that allow kids to move," Lodes said. "The parents move, the kids move, all the climbing features, I think it's really neat that the kids are getting exercise and enjoying themselves while they're moving."

The new playground will be located in the grass directly across (south) from where the old shelter was located, and it is replacing the equipment that was removed for several projects last year. The location of the playground was largely determined by available space following a new access road and channel work on Thompson Creek.

The equipment will emphasize a nature-play theme with the following features: obstacle course, log suspension, playground with logs and rocks for climbing and playing, swing set combination and a spinner wheel. The area will have a combination of pour-in-place playground surfacing as well as wood fiber, and the entire space will be surrounded by sidewalks.

The playground will be completely ADA accessible, and benches will also be installed as part of this project.

Additional projects in Central Park East are scheduled for 2024, including construction of a new restroom building and shelter, which will be installed after a new, realigned road is built through the park. The new restroom building will go where the old one was located, and the shelter will be located just to the west of the restrooms.

Yahoo! named the 2023 Friend of La Vista.

Jon Branigan, Warehouse Manager, explained that while Yahoo! is a global company, it is committed to contributing locally to the communities where it operates.

"Yahoo! is a large company, we have facilities all over the country and world and they all do their parts in their specific communities," said Branigan. "It comes from the top down that it's more than just working for Yahoo!, it's also representing Yahoo! outside of the company itself.

"The overall culture Yahoo! has created is one that involves others. We're not just singularly focused on what we're doing company-wise on a day-to-day basis, or just trying to make money for the company. It's about being involved in the community wherever we are.

"A lot of us are from here or grew up in the area," said Branigan. "I think it's kind of our duty and responsibility to kind of give back to the area."

Volunteering is also good for morale. Yahoo!'s employees frequently mention how much they enjoy their experiences volunteering with the City of La Vista.



"Every person I talk to says, 'You know what, that was kind of fun. That was kind of cool.' I think it just kind of comes back to you — doing something for somebody else," Branigan said.

For their commitment and service to the La Vista community, volunteer members of Yahoo!'s Culture Force will be honored at La Vista's Salute to Summer Festival on May 27. But as Branigan explained, Yahoo! employees don't volunteer in order to earn recognition.

"It's just important to kind of be out there whether people know that we're doing it or not. It's just nice to be involved in what the community is working on and what they might need help with."


MORE THAN A LOGO...

Salute to Summer brings back La Vista Gives #LoveOurVets Project.

For the second consecutive year, the Salute to Summer Festival will offer attendees the opportunity to participate in a La Vista Gives service project. A popular part of last year's festival, the #LoveOurVets project—which gives back to men and women who have served in the military—will again be this year's featured project.

Beginning at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 27, festivalgoers are invited to stop inside City Hall and assemble a personal hygiene kit for Moving Veterans

Forward, a local non-profit organization working to place homeless veterans in permanent housing. Volunteers can pack kits until 4:30 p.m. or until supplies run out, whichever comes first.

The City purchased and received donations for 200 kits.

Kits are easy to assemble, so all ages are welcome to participate in this meaningful community project. Everyone that packs a kit will be able to write their own thank you note to include for the veteran who receives the kit.

After the festival, all hygiene kits will be given to Moving Veterans Forward to distribute to veterans who are homeless or being moved into new housing.

A partnership between the City of La Vista, the La Vista Community Foundation and other organizations, **La Vista Gives** provides multiple opportunities for community members to give back through special projects throughout the year. Mike Krzywicki and family selected as La Vista's Military Family of the Year.

Every year, the City of La Vista chooses a Military Family of the Year to celebrate during the Salute to Summer Festival. This year, that honor goes to the Krzywicki family.

Mike Krzywicki joined the Air Force in 1971 at a time during the Vietnam War when the U.S. was readying to end the draft. Krzywicki knew he wanted to serve in the military. His father had been in the U.S. Army and fought in Europe during World War II. Other family members had also served. So Krzywicki, a Chicago native, enlisted in the Air Force. That decision would ultimately help shape his life and cultivate a lifelong commitment to community service.

After completing basic training in San Angelo, Texas and an assignment at Castle Air Force Base in California, Krzywicki landed at Offutt Air Force Base. While serving at Offutt he met his future wife, Pat. He completed four years of military service and then moved on to study at the University of Nebraska-Omaha.

Krzywicki and his wife chose to stay in the area. He eagerly sought out opportunities to volunteer in the community.

Fast forward to the present, Mike has compiled a lengthy service resume. He's served on La Vista's Planning Commission for 38 years. He was an original La Vista Community Foundation board member, serving that organization for six years—two as president. Krzywicki also recently ended a 25-year run on the Papillion-La Vista Schools Foundation Board. During that time, he spent one term as the board president, served as chairman of the grant committee and worked on several other committees to help provide funds for students and teachers. He also volunteers regularly as a Knights of Columbus member at St. Columbkille Church.

Krzywicki credits both his father and the military for shaping him into a public servant.

"I think my dad instilled a little bit of volunteerism into my genes," said Krzywicki. "He volunteered a lot through his local VFW and things like that."


Krzywicki also feels the Air Force fueled his desire to serve his community. "I think in the military, they really do emphasize service—more than just your normal job—to volunteer and do things in the communities that you're stationed around."

Krzywicki's family became more involved in their community as his children grew. Over the years Mike served as a volunteer coach in La Vista for youth baseball, softball, volleyball and basketball teams. He also led Boy Scout troops in La Vista, which opened the door to a particularly fun opportunity: ushering at Memorial Stadium during Husker football games in the 1990s.

"They made me the stadium coordinator for all the ushers that were in the east stadium," Krzywicki said. "They gave me a walkie talkie, which was connected to the Red Cross. So, in case there were medical emergencies, the volunteers would come to me. That was kind of a nice ten years."

Mike and Pat passed a spirit of service on to their children, Joseph and Susan. Joseph followed Mike's example and joined the military to serve his country.

Kryzwicki explained that La Vista is special because it offers so many options for community service. "People have the opportunity to serve on different boards, commissions, etc. and also city council."

Sue & Bob Foehlinger selected as parade Grand Marshals.

If you've attended La Vista's annual parade anytime since 1973, you've probably seen the Stepperettes perform. The La Vista-based organization turns 50 this year. Directors Sue and Bob Foehlinger will be honored as the Salute to Summer Parade Grand Marshals to celebrate the milestone and the group's longtime community involvement.

During the summer of 1973, Sue taught baton twirling lessons in her driveway to a small group of girls who wanted to twirl in parades. One of their first performances was La Vista's parade. A short time later, Sue was invited to run a recreational baton program in La Vista.

"It was La Vista's Recreation Department, they had all kinds of things for kids, and they decided to throw baton twirling in," Sue said.

As Sue's group grew and performed more locally, she moved from teaching lessons at the building on Park View Blvd. that is now Fire Station #4, to the gym at G. Stanley Hall Elementary. She taught there for 15 years. The group kept growing and the Foehlingers decided to look for a studio space, but they wanted to stay in La Vista. "Our base is here. This is where we began our program," Sue said. "La Vista has always been super supportive of the Stepperettes."

The Foehlingers leased a space near 114th and Harrison St. and that was the Stepperettes' home for 20 years. In 2018, Sue and Bob opened the Steppe Center—a dual-purpose building that is part twirling studio and part event center.

Running a baton and dance studio for hundreds of students while also hosting weddings, fundraisers and other large events each week requires a lot of help. On any given day, you can find multiple members of the Foehlinger family at the Steppe Center.

The Foehlingers' daughters teach baton, tumbling and dance classes alongside Sue. Their son assists Bob with tours and event booking. Sue's mother and sister pitch in regularly, as do the sons-in-law, grandchildren and other family members.

The love the family pours into their businesses is the reason why the Stepperettes are going strong after 50 years. It's also led to some impressive achievements. The group has won multiple national and world championship titles. They've performed in London, Paris, Rome and countless other places across Europe and even in the former Soviet Union. They've also marched in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, the Dublin St. Patrick's Day Parade in Ireland and the nighttime parade at Disney World—plus more than 300 local parades.

Sue explained that all the experiences—from performing at La Vista's Christmas Tree Lighting to taking the team on international trips—helped build a large extended family of Stepperette alumni.

"I feel very blessed to have that extended family," Sue said. "There's just so many great, great memories and it's a very rewarding life."

Bob added that they feel motivated to keep the business going for at least another 50 years. "As long as the kids keep showing up for the parades, we'll keep marching."



Beaming with community pride.

Think about the last time you signed your name. Maybe it was on a receipt for a meal you purchased or a birthday card for a friend. Whether you realize it in the moment or not, the small gesture of signing your name is significant. Your signature is your own personal mark that represents you.

Many La Vista residents lent their signatures recently to help transform a blank piece of construction material into a meaningful community representation that will be installed in Central Park.

This spring, the City invited anyone with ties to La Vista to "Make a Mark" and sign one of the steel beams that will support two 35-foot-long slides near The Link in Central Park.

Construction company JE Dunn set up a blank 9-foot beam at the La Vista Public Library and another one in City Hall. La Vista residents filled the beams with colorful signatures, messages and artwork.

A replacement beam was taken to the Library to accommodate more signatures after the first beam was quickly covered in names and messages.

Crews are now treating the three beams with a clear coating to help preserve the community's markings. When they're installed, the beams will be left exposed so the signatures will be visible to parkgoers enjoying the slides.

The slides are expected to be constructed later this summer. They'll run from the east side of 84th Street down into the park.



Ryan South named La Vista's 2022 Employee of the Year.

Ryan South was honored at the City's annual employee recognition event held earlier this year. He currently serves as the City's Information Technology Manager, though he's held several different roles during his 18-year tenure.

Ryan said he feels "honored and grateful" to be named Employee of the Year. "It's rewarding to know that my work and contributions have been recognized and appreciated by my colleagues and superiors," said South. "I couldn't have achieved this without their support, and I'm grateful for their encouragement and collaboration." Congratulations, Ryan!

La Vista Lifesavers

Police Chief Bob Lausten recently presented lifesaving awards to several City employees for providing lifesaving assistance during emergencies. The calm response and quick thinking of these individuals directly resulted in lives being saved in our community. And their stories reinforce the importance of emergency training.



Officer John Danderand

La Vista police officer John Danderand received a Lifesaving Award for performing CPR and utilizing an AED (while off duty) to assist an individual in cardiac arrest. John was alerted of an unresponsive man after a neighbor came to his door early one morning. He grabbed his AED out of his vehicle and began administering medical aid. Members of the Papillion Fire Department crew that responded during this same incident were also recognized for their lifesaving actions.

La Vista City employees Kaily Stanley, Sue Tangeman, Bob Perry, Kevin Pokorny and a team from the Papillion Fire Department received Lifesaving Awards for their actions in helping save the life of a man who suffered a medical episode while walking at the La Vista Community Center. The employees worked together to perform CPR and use an AED before rescue crews arrived.

Officer Nick Jeanette was also awarded the Police Department's Lifesaving Award for his lifesaving efforts while off duty. Nick was at a restaurant with his wife, noticed a man nearby was choking and stepped in to perform the Heimlich maneuver.

Meghan Engberg, who works in the City's Community Development Department, received a Citizen Appreciation Award for performing the Heimlich maneuver on her boyfriend when he was choking while they were dining at a local restaurant.



Offseason projects keep La Vista's fields player-ready.

La Vista's sports fields get a lot of action at this time of year. Here is a look at some of the projects Public Works crews completed in the offseason to ensure that fields are in top shape for teams this spring and summer.

Sports Complex Baseball/Softball Field #2

Public Works regraded field #2 at the La Vista Sports Complex to improve drainage, fill in low spots and remove the lip. Regrading noticeably improved the third base dugout entrance area—correcting a 10 to 12-inch difference between the field and dugout. Now, the field's edge is flush with the concrete of the dugout.

Soccer Field #9

Field #9 was wearing down and developing low areas. Crews assessed the severity of the issue and determined that tilling a portion of the field and laying down sod was the best solution. This resulted in a more even playing surface.

City Park Softball Field #2

Public Works completed several renovations on softball field #2 at City Park last year, including reshaping the field and removing a lip, adding an engineered soil to the infield to help control moisture and minimize maintenance needs, and rolling the infield with a street roller to improve the surface.

Work continues on the Applewood Creek Trail Project.

After a short break during the winter, crews resumed work on the Applewood Creek Trail project earlier this spring. La Vista residents may recall that this project is creating a new 10-foot-wide recreational trail that runs north and south near 101st street and connects to the existing trail in Portal Ridge SID south of Giles Road.

With work on the southern portion of the project complete, crews turned their attention to the north side

of Giles. They are currently working to complete the section of the new trail north of Giles Road and finish the north half of a pedestrian underpass under Giles Road. As a result, traffic on the north side of Giles has temporarily been restricted. Restrictions are expected to last through the month of June, weather permitting.

Crews are also finishing work on the final portion of the trail north of Brentwood Drive that connects to the existing trail system within the Cimarron Woods SID. The entire project is expected to be ready for the community's enjoyment later this summer.


