MINUTE WITH THE MAYOR



If you noticed orange traffic cones dotting La Vista's landscape this summer, it's because construction crews were busy working to complete eight resurfacing and concrete rehabilitation projects. The Public Works Department successfully coordinated these street projects that led to significant improvements to roads and parking lots in several areas of the city.

Four of the improvement projects, such as the street resurfacing in the Parkview Heights neighborhood, were done using a maintenance method called the Ultra-Thin Bonded Asphalt System, otherwise known as UBAS. Working proactively to maintain and preserve the integrity of our roads using UBAS is helping the City avoid larger, more costly repairs in the future. If you want to learn more about the projects and the related cost savings, see page 13 of this newsletter.

I want to commend Public Works staff for the effort they put into organizing and managing these large street projects.

If you happen to notice a street that needs repair, or you have another concern to report, it is easier than ever to relay the issue to City staff. The City recently adopted a new reporting system called SeeClickFix. You can read about this new system on page 3, and see how it offers residents an easier, more streamlined reporting experience.

I hope to see you in Central Park for National Night Out on Tuesday, August 5. The event begins at 6 p.m. and it offers a chance to talk to members of the Police Department. I invite you to ask questions and get to know the men and women in uniform working to keep your neighborhood safe. The more our residents and police officers work together, the safer we can make La Vista.

Speaking of safety, pages 15 and 16 of this newsletter highlight safety information shared by our Police Department—including valuable back-to-school safety reminders. I urge you to follow these tips to help make our school zones safe for students commuting to and from school.

New system in place for resident reports

La Vista residents now have a new, streamlined way to report requests and concerns to city staff.

The City is now using the SeeClickFix system to manage all issues reported by its residents for things such as code enforcement, streets, and parks.

Using the City's website, CityofLaVista.org/ReportAConcern, or the SeeClickFix app, residents can easily report an issue, which will be routed to the appropriate department for resolution.

The SeeClickFix system watches for repeat requests and will let the requestor know if someone else has reported the issue. Residents can report an issue with a SeeClickFix account or as a guest without an account.

Users who report issues as a guest without an account will not receive updates as staff works on the request. Certain request categories are also set up to allow the reporter to be anonymous, but their info is still visible to staff working the request.

If you would like to report an issue with your smartphone, please download the SeeClickFix app and search for "La Vista, NE". The SeeClickFix app is available for download for both Apple and Android devices.

City of La Vista staff responds to requests Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. If a request comes in on a holiday, weekend or after-hours, it will be received the next business day.

Prevent fires at home, use Lithium-Ion batteries safely

Fire Prevention Week is October 5-11, and this year's theme is **"Charge into Safety."**

Many of the electronics in your home are powered by lithium-ion batteries, including laptops, mobile phones, tablets, headphones, smartwatches, drones and other rechargeable items.

Because Lithium-Ion batteries store so much energy in a small space, they can sometimes overheat/explode and cause fires if used incorrectly or when damaged.

The Papillion Fire Department encourages everyone to be smart when using Lithium-Ion batteries, and **follow these safety tips** from the National Fire Protection Association:

- Buy only listed products.** When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery, look for a safety certification mark such as UL, ETL, or CSA. This means it meets important safety standards.

- Charge devices safely.** Use the cables that came with the product and follow the instructions from the manufacturer. Charge devices on a hard surface. Don't overcharge—unplug or remove the battery when your device is fully charged.

- Stop using your device right away if the battery smells weird, gets too hot, makes popping noises, changes in shape or color.** If it is safe, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

- Recycle batteries responsibly.** Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could start a fire. Instead, recycle devices/batteries at a safe battery recycling location. Visit call2recycle.org to find a recycling spot near you.

Residents of La Vista often remark that the City's small-town feel is one of its best attributes. There's just something special about the sense of community here, and how people look out for one another.

La Vista's community-minded and caring nature was on display recently during the annual La Vista Gives School Supply Drive. Throughout the month of July, donations of pencils, notebooks, markers, folders and other supplies poured in thanks to generous donors across the City.

This year's drive was held in support of students and classrooms at G. Stanley Hall Elementary School and La Vista Middle School. The La Vista Gives volunteer team is currently sorting the supplies and will deliver them to the schools prior to students' first day of class.




Public Works drives progress with major infrastructure projects

Driving through La Vista feels noticeably smoother thanks to a series of recent street improvements. This summer, the Public Works Department managed a full slate of major infrastructure projects—four concrete rehabilitation projects and another four street/parking lot resurfacing projects.

The street upgrades were guided by the City's Pavement Management Plan, which helped Public Works prioritize projects based on road conditions. Work was completed (or is nearly complete) on these projects:

- Harrison Street reconstruction from the intersection at Giles & Harrison to the I-80 overpass
- Park View Boulevard reconstruction from 84th Street to 85th Street
- Panel repair along 72nd Street
- Storm sewer inlet top replacements along Harrison Street and 72nd Street
- Parkview Heights neighborhood street resurfacing (UBAS)
- Resurfacing north of Park View Blvd. between 72nd Street and 78th Street (UBAS)
- City Hall parking lot resurfacing (UBAS)
- Resurfacing the parking lot drive lane in front of Cabela's (UBAS)

Four resurfacing projects used Ultra-Thin Bonded Asphalt Surfacing (UBAS), a method preferred for its cost efficiency. UBAS is typically one-third to one-half the cost of traditional 2-inch mill and overlay. As a result, the City's nearly \$1.5M spend on resurfacing was significantly lower than it would have been with conventional methods and allowed more projects to be completed this year.

Beyond the eight street projects, Public Works oversaw the final stages of the multi-year East La Vista Sewer Project. The project is substantially complete, with all major sewer and related pavement rehabilitation completed. At the time this newsletter went to print, crews were finishing up lining manholes and sewer pipe—the last steps prior to closing out the project.

Officer Barnett stepped in and administered compressions until fire department personnel arrived. He was recognized for his prompt and alert actions that helped save a life.





Know Your 9 P.M. Routine

The La Vista Police Department is proud to announce its participation in the 9PM Routine program. Originally created as a social media campaign by a Sheriff's Office in Florida, the now nationwide program aims to reduce preventable crime by sharing easy-to-follow safety tips. It has been adopted by law enforcement agencies across the U.S. to improve crime prevention awareness in communities.

In the meantime, implement your own 9 p.m. nightly routine by taking actions to make your property less attractive to criminals.

- **Remove valuables from your vehicle.** Criminals target items that are visible from vehicle windows. This can include electronics, cash, high value sports equipment and other belongings that are hard to trace if stolen. Removing or obscuring these items makes vehicles less desirable targets.
- **Lock your car.** Unlocked vehicles invite simple thefts. According to nationally collected security footage, leaving vehicles unlocked is a growing trend in the U.S. Intentionally locking your doors each night can make a criminal skip your vehicle.
- **Secure your home.** Before heading to bed, and every time you leave the house, ensure all exterior doors are locked. Homeowners may want to utilize multiple types of locks including deadbolts and door chains, and turn on a home alarm and exterior light.
- **Close your garage door.** By securing your garage, you are also securing your home. Be sure to lock the interior entrance door from the garage for an added layer of protection.
- **Collect your mail.** La Vista has seen sporadic increases in mail theft throughout the year. Criminals target mail, particularly around April (tax returns), November/ December (gifts and packages), and manipulate stolen personal identity documents for scams or fraud. Retrieving mail from your mailbox daily helps reduce identity exposure and risk of fraud.

These simple and easy steps help protect property and vehicles from burglary and theft.



Back to School Safety

With students heading back to school, traffic from walkers, bikers and drivers will increase in school zones. The Police Department offers these reminders to keep everyone safe:

- **Plan ahead.** Expect increased traffic during morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up times—leave early and stay patient. Traffic near schools can be busy; keeping calm and following rules helps everyone stay safe.
- **Slow down in school zones.** Obey posted speed limits and be prepared to stop for crossing guards and students.
- **Watch for school buses.** Never pass a stopped school bus with flashing red lights. It's dangerous—and illegal.
- **Avoid distractions.** Put down the phone and stay alert. Children can be unpredictable near roads and crossings.
- **Yield to pedestrians.** Always stop for people in crosswalks, especially near schools and parks.
- **Avoid double parking or stopping in traffic lanes.** Double parking disrupts traffic flow and can put kids at risk crossing between cars.
- **Follow school rules & signs.** Schools usually have specific rules for parking and pick-up/drop-off areas—stick to them to keep kids safe and facilitate better traffic flow.
